ICUDDR is a global consortium of Institutes of Center for Credentialing and Accreditation: Higher Education linking science, policy education, and service, to address substance use envisions becoming the leading global challenges and strengthen communities. This is accomplished by the work of our four centers:

Center for Educational Program Development:

The Center for Educational Program Development at ICUDDR is dedicated to expanding the reach and impact of addiction studies programs. As a global consortium, ICUDDR serves as a hub for networking, collaboration, and knowledge exchange among researchers, faculty, and institutions working in drug demand reduction through its membership, regional coordinating centers, and no-cost, accessible educational events, and resources.

The vision and mission of the Center for Systems Change are operationalized through its programs, one such program is the International Technology Transfer Center (ITTC) Network.

ICUDDR-GCCC, a program by ICUDDR credentialing organization for substance use professionals, dedicated to enhancing the health and well-being of individuals, families, and communities. Their mission is to train. professionalize, and expand the substance use workforce in the region, providing experience verification and appropriate exams to ensure that governments and other employers hire and utilize the most qualified professionals.

The Coming Year (2024-2025):

ICUDDR is pleased to announce that we have been awarded two grants from the Bureau of Narcotics and Law Enforcement to support the work of the Centers. We have also been successful in receiving a continuation subaward from the University of Wisconsin. We are continuing to look for other funding opportunities to enable the development of programs across our four centers. She is credentialed as an international addiction professional (ICAP), is widely published, has won research grants, and has presented in numerous

conferences in the field of addiction science. Dr. Kathungu is a founder and former executive board member of the International Society of Substance Use Professionals (ISSUP) Kenya. She is a current Global Master Trainer for the Universal Treatment Curriculum (UTC) as well as a trainer for the CHILD curriculum for addressing drug problems in children, and has conducted several trainings in Asia, Africa, South America and Europe. Dr. Kathungu was instrumental in the adaptation of the Universal Treatment Curriculum (UTC) into a university based academic program, the Postgraduate Diploma in Addiction treatment Science, currently offered at Kenyatta University and is a member of the editorial board for the African Journal of Alcohol and Drug abuse (AJADA) by NACADA.

Dr. Kathungu is the current Africa Region coordinator of the International Consortium of Universities on Drug Demand Reduction (ICUDDR), and is providing leadership and mentorship Mulvey, Dr. Fran Calvo, Dr. Prapapun Chucharoen, on development of university based academic programs that promote evidence based practice in the area of treatment and prevention of SUDs in Africa.

He is also the Assistant Coordinator of the International Consortium of Universities for Drug Demand Reduction (ICUDDR) in Africa, the National Coordinator of the Universal Prevention Curriculum (UPC) in Nigeria and a Board member, Academoral Rehab and Empowerment Project (AREP), Fountain University, Osogbo, Osun State.



Dr. Agwogie is a Global trainer in Drug Demand Reduction, an expert contributor to the UNODC/WHO International Standards on Drug Use Prevention and the UNODC Guiding Document on the Role of Law Enforcement Officers in Drug Use Prevention in the School Setting from Nigeria. He is an Asst. Professor, Department of Psychology, Virginia Commonwealth University, United States, a Fulbright Scholar (Hubert Humphrey Fellow) in Substance Use Prevention, Treatment and Policy, Virginia Commonwealth University, United States, and a Distinguished Hubert Humphrey Fellow. An alumnus of the prestigious Harvard Kennedy School of Executive Education, United States and King's College London. A fellow of the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), United states and a Fellow the Nigerian Association of Clinical Psychologists (FNACP). Changing the Narrative: The Essential Role of Language in Addiction Research

The language used in addiction research significantly affects societal perceptions and the efficacy of treatment outcomes. Stigmatizing terminology can perpetuate negative stereotypes and discourage individuals from seeking help. This article examines the implications of such language and underscores the responsibility of researchers and educators to adopt inclusive terminology, as outlined by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) (NIDA, 2023). By advocating for person-first language and addressing the consequences of stigmatizing terms, we can foster a more compassionate and effective discourse surrounding addiction.

Stigmatizing language around addiction extends beyond shaping perceptions and has direct consequences on health outcomes. The language that labels individuals as "addicts" or characterizes addiction as a moral failing can result in discriminatory attitudes from healthcare professionals, reducing the quality of care for those with substance use disorders. This stigma can discourage individuals from seeking treatment, leading to worsening health conditions and lower engagement in recovery programs. Furthermore, stigma not only affects individual behavior but also reinforces structural barriers in healthcare. limiting access to essential services like

reduction programs (Livingston, 2020). As a result, stigmatizing language perpetuates a cycle of untreated illness and poor health outcomes, making it imperative to address addiction-related language usage in discussions.

NIDA's Guidelines on Language

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) encourages us to reevaluate the language we use, providing alternatives that promote a more compassionate dialogue.

According to NIDA (2023), terms that label individuals based on their addiction, such as "addict" or "alcoholic," can lead to feelings of "I am the problem" rather than "I have a problem." By adopting person-first language—such as "person with substance use disorder"—we can help destigmatize addiction, focusing on the individual rather than their condition. This approach promotes dignity and respect, encouraging those affected to seek help without the fear of judgement.

Additionally, instead of using the term "abuse," which is often associated with negative judgments and punishment, it is recommended to use "use" for illicit drugs and "misuse" for prescription medications. This shift in language can help reduce the association with negative judgments and punishment. While "medication-assisted therapy" (MAT) is a widely recognized term, it may imply that medication is a secondary treatment option. NIDA suggests using "medications for substance use disorders"e.g. Medication for Opioid Use Disorder known as MOUD- to emphasize the integral role these medications play comprehensive recovery plan.

When discussing recovery, we should also reconsider terms like "sober" and "clean," as these can create feelings of exclusion and imply moral judgement. Instead, using "abstinent" terms like and negative" provides a more clinically accurate description. Phrases such as "in recovery" or "in remission" acknowledge the ongoing journey individuals experience,

substance use disorder treatment and harm fostering a more inclusive understanding of their situations.

Recommendations for Change

To mitigate stigma in addiction research and practice, several key recommendations are proposed:

- 1. Adopt Person-First Language: Emphasize the individual over the condition in both research and clinical environments to uphold dignity.
- 2. Educate Stakeholders: Implement training sessions for faculty, researchers, healthcare professionals, and students on the significance of language and the importance of utilizing non-stigmatizing terms
- 3. Revise Research Publications: Encourage academic journals and institutions to establish guidelines that advocate for respectful language in all published materials related to addiction.

Conclusion

The language used in addiction research has profound implications for individuals, communities, and the healthcare system. Transitioning to non-stigmatizing terminology empowers researchers and educators to reshape the narrative surrounding addiction. This linguistic change is not merely a matter of preference; it is a critical step towards fostering empathy, enhancing treatment outcomes, and reducing stigma. By adopting inclusive language, we can cultivate a more compassionate approach understanding and treatment of addiction.

The Collaborative Alumni Project (CAP) aimed to address the rising challenges posed by synthetic drug use in Nigeria, Uganda, and Togo. Synthetic drugs have become a significant public health concern, and the project seek to mitigate this threat by enhancing local capacities and fostering collaborative knowledge-sharing among key stakeholders.

The primary objectives of this project are to conduct a rapid assessment on the knowledge, attitudes and practices relating to synthetic drugs to help understand the current trends in synthetic drug use, production and trafficking across the three countries and to develop evidence-based interventions. In addition, raise awareness, engage key stakeholders through educational and outreach activities, including webinars, media discussions and the dissemination of findings through policy briefs.

Grantees are Alumni of the Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program, a 10-month leadership and professional development program sponsored by the United States government through the Institute of International Education (IIE).

Renew Online!



Training of Trainers in Peer-to-Peer Treatment of Psychological Trauma and Co-occurring Disorders

ICUDDR Board member and ITTC Ukraine Director, Dr. Irina Pinchuk, and colleagues shared highlights from a training of trainers held in Uzhgorod on October 15-17. The training of trainers in Peer-to-Peer Treatment of Psychological Trauma and Co-Occurring Disorders was made up of participants of 20 trainers from Ukraine, who themselves have combat experience who can now scale up the acquired knowledge in a "peer-to-peer" format. There were representatives of various departments: non-governmental sector, field of mental health care, and in particular - military psychologists who work in hospitals, including prisoners of war, psychologists of the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the National Guard, the State Emergency Service, rehabilitation centers, and representatives of departments of relevant ministries.

The course was taught by American experts who specialize in working with people with combat experience.


